THE NITTY-GRITTY: WHAT STICKS OUT

THE FIVE SENSES

Sometimes when we write it's easy to just focus on what we can see, but that's only half the picture (well, one fifth!) The **five senses** through which we perceive the world are:



Sight



Smell



Taste



Touch

SHOW, DON'T TELL

Perhaps you've heard the line "Show, don't tell" before. But what does it mean?

To show is to use details to reveal information, rather than just stating something.

If you say that a character "smells bad," for example, the reader loses out on an opportunity to learn more about them. But what if "they smell like old sweat and grass clippings?"



BE SPECIFIC

It's important to be specific to help your reader see what you are imagining as a writer. For example, if you were to tell someone you were in your bedroom, you know exactly what that looks like! But to someone else, they might picture this:

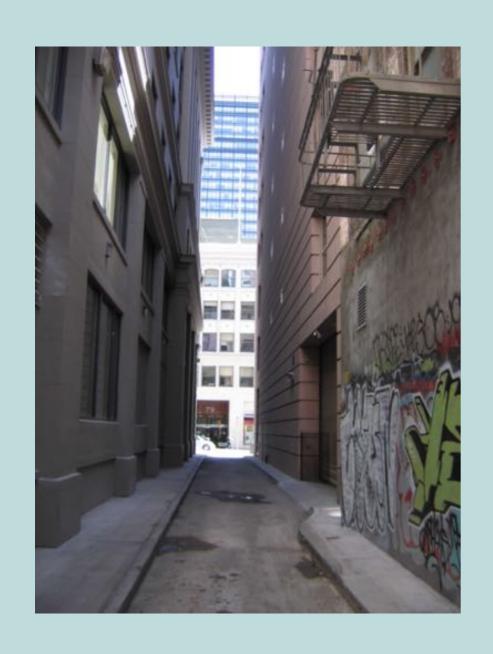


THINGS TO REMEMBER

Keep in mind:

- ➤ We perceive details with all five of our senses, not just what we see
- > Specific details are more impactful for your reader
- > Details can reveal characters and the world around them
- ➤ It's possible to overwrite and include too many details, which can slow and even halt the action in the story.
 - ➤ If you find yourself over-describing, focus on what's important for the reader to know!

EVERYTHING YOU SEE (AND HEAR, AND SMELL, AND...)
